Fruit & Vegetables

All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor. All vegetables must have their natural stem with calyx where applicable.

N. B. Garlic should have a 3” stem. All exhibits should be clean and well presented. Soil or other debris should be gently removed, (gently rinsed and patted dry if necessary.) **Do not** damage the surface or remove “bloom.”

All plants and flowers must be home grown. Flowers and foliage used in arrangements must be fresh, not artificial. Please, do not use flexible or valuable containers. Ensure containers are sufficient to offset heavy blooms

3. Remove all cakes, breads etc. from pans. All baking should be displayed on a Foil-covered base, **or** on suitable plates, unless other directions are given. If possible.
4. **Muffins and cupcakes may be made using paper liners, but must be removed to show.**
5. No commercially prepared mixes.
